#### 2017 Historic Preservation Awards



Frank and Tom Madden are the Individual Recipients of our 2017 Historic Preservation Award. They have made significant contributions to preserve and promote the history of our local community, have supported the Historical Society as Century Club members, and contributed to local genealogy.

Among their many contributions are genealogy research, including the Madden family tree and documentation of the participation of Thomas Clark Madden in the Civil War; articles for *The Greene Hills of Home* on such topics as The First National Bank of Newfoundland, F. A. Madden & Son, Madden genealogy, Greene-Dreher High School, and the Madden and Haag farms; donation of historical photographs, documents and artifacts from the Madden family; illustrations, photographs, documents and information about the history of F.A. Madden & Son for the recent publication, *Mills on the Wallenpaupack*; and participation in the Veterans History Project.

Even though Frank and Tom live in Wisconsin and Colorado, respectively, they are dedicated to our mission to preserve local history.

Diane Smith presented the 2017 Historic Preservation Award to Frank Madden who accepted it on behalf of himself and his brother, Tom, who lives in Colorado and was unable to attend.



John (Jack) Wesley Akers is the recipient of our 2017 Historic Preservation Award for a Residential Property for the preservation of the Charles W. and Sarah Ansley Akers home built in 1876. It has been the home of four generations of the Akers family and has had few modifications made to the interior or exterior since it was built. The Akers home is an excellent example of houses built in its time period.

The two-story, white clapboard "L" shaped house is fronted with a porch and carved wooden columns. The original single family house comprised the southern section of the present home and included a basement. The kitchen, living room, dining room and bathroom were on the first floor with bedrooms on the second floor. An addition was built with a kitchen and living room on the first floor and two bedrooms and a bathroom on the second floor.

Jack Akers, great -grandson of Charles and Sarah Akers, is the current owner of the house. Caring for an historic house requires hard work and a commitment to maintaining the building's historic integrity. Through his preservation efforts, Jack has ensured the Akers Homestead stands as a proud tribute to the generations of the Akers Family who called it home.

Sue Reichman presented the 2017 Historic Preservation Award to her son, Ross, who accepted it on behalf of Jack who was unable to attend.

To help our fundraising efforts, Roger Altemier volunteered to make Christmas wreaths with his wreath-making machine. #### Veterans History Project

The young man to the left is Haye Wever, son of Dr. Peter Wever and Michaja Schoneveld who live in The Netherlands. Peter authored the article regarding World War I veteran Private Harry Grimm which appeared in the September 2017 issue of *The Greene Hills of Home*. In September, they visited the Meuse-Argonne Cemetery in France where Haye placed flowers on the grave of Private First Class Sidney B. Bartleson in the presence of his father, aunt and uncle, Emma and Wido Roordo.

Born in Newfoundland, PA, Sidney was the grandson of the potter Thomas Burns about whom an article also appeared in the September issue. Through our research, we learned of PFC Bartleson and, with the assistance of his great niece, Ellie Green of Knoxville, TN, were able to piece together his life story. PFC Bartleson served with the Third Infantry, Third Division, American Expeditionary Forces and was Killed in Action on October 12, 1918 during the Meuse-Argonne Offensive.
