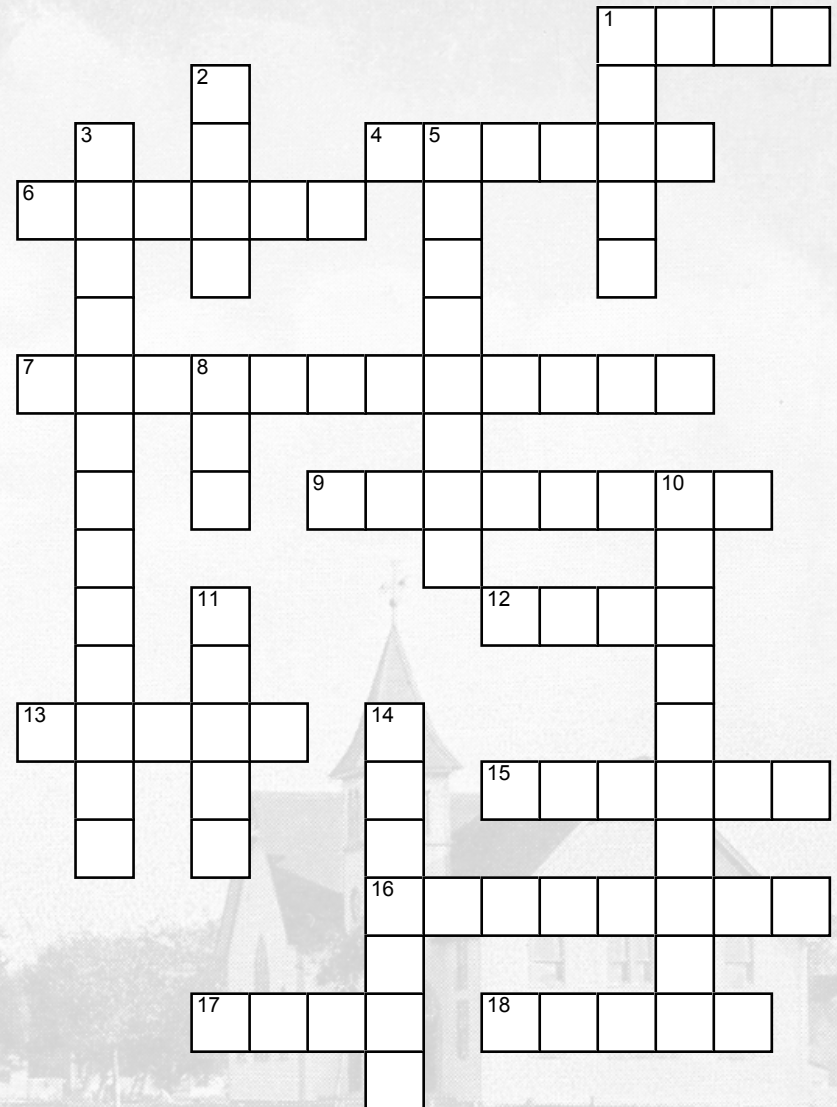

## MATCHING GAME

Outbuildings served many purposes:

1. Where objects were forged from iron or steel, using tools to hammer, bend, and cut the metal.
2. Sap collected from maple trees in early spring was boiled here to make maple syrup.
3. Where meat or fish were cured by smoke, to preserve it.
4. With one or more seats and a pit, serving as a toilet.
5. Before indoor plumbing, it would have a bucket that could be lowered on a rope into the well and filled with water.
6. Where firewood was stored, for use in cooking and heating.
7. Where female chickens, or hens, were kept, with nest boxes for egg-laying and perches on which the birds could sleep.
8. Underground structure where food was stored to protect it from the heat in summer and freezing in winter.
9. Built over a spring and used to keep milk and butter cool.
10. For drying and storing ears of corn, for food for animals.
11. Used as a kitchen in warm weather, allowing the farmhouse to remain cool in the evening.
12. Large cakes of ice, harvested in the winter, were packed in sawdust and stored here for use in summer.

# Preserve & Pickle

Before electricity, fresh produce from the orchard and garden was preserved at home. Mason jars filled with fruits and vegetables were sterilized by placing them in a canner filled with water and heating them on a cookstove for a specified length of time. The jars were stored in the root cellar and provided food for the family during the cold winter months.
