## Honoring our Flag



The Greene-Dreher Historical Society hosted Carol Weyandt, Administrative Assistant, and Don Borkey, National Secretary, of the Patriotic Order Sons of America (POSA) (front left), in a flag presentation and raising ceremony at our July Open House. Girl Scout Troop 50749 raised the flags of both the United States and Pennsylvania. Secretary Borkey remarks follow:

"I'm delighted to be here at the former Patriotic Order Sons of America Camp #422 Camp Hall. It's great to see it in such good condition and placed on the National Register of Historic Places. Washington Camp #422 was instituted in 1889 with 44 members, and increased their membership to 138 in two years. They originally met in the Gilpin and Barnes Hall before constructing this building in 1904. As this building still serves the community, now as the Greene-Dreher Historical Society, the Patriotic Order Sons of America, which was founded in 1847, still serves as a promoter of Patriotism in our local communities and nation. We promote Patriotism in many ways: scholarships in local schools; memorials and support of America's veterans; and presenting flags for display in local communities. The Flag stands for all we hold dear - freedom and democracy of the people, by the people, and for the people. I would like to now present this flag to be flown on the grounds of this historic place."

Following the ceremony, guests toured the museum and outdoor exhibits and enjoyed ice cream made by Sam Conklin and Luanne Bailey on a 1910 hit-and-miss engine. We thank our bakers who provided delicious homemade pies and cookies. Our final Open House of the year will be on Saturday, October 13. It will feature Bluegrass jam sessions, book-signings by local authors and a homemade jam and jelly sale.

Our thanks to Ed Kramer and Roger Altemier who completed resetting grave markers in Kipptown Cemetery (also known as Old Greentown Cemetery) this summer. Photographs show the process used for the marker of Corporal Thomas T. Dickinson, Company L, 117th Regiment, 13th Pennsylvania Cavalry who was fatally wounded at St. Mary's Church, Charles City County, Virginia on June 24, 1864. The next phase in this cemetery's restoration is for professional arborists to remove trees endangering the grave markers and washing the markers by volunteers in 2019. A list has been prioritized for the restoration of historic Simonstown Cemetery in Greentown which will also begin in 2019. ## **Bob's Bottle Collection**



Joining us in August was Bob Wood from the Equinunk Historical Society. Bob, who been collecting antique canning bottles for over 50 years, brought a small sample of his collection. 1858 was the year that John Mason received patent approval for his revolutionary canning bottle. He invented the process for cutting a thread onto the lip of glass bottles as well as a corresponding thread inside zinc lids which could then be screwed tightly on the bottles. Zinc lids were later replaced with glass lids fastened in place with a wire clamp. Canning bottles provided a new means to preserve food in addition to salting, smoking, pickling, and drying.

## Antique Car Visit

The Slo Pokes Antique Ford Car Club stopped by Peggy Bancroft Hall during their June 30 rally. Members toured the hall and grounds following a brief presentation by Ruth Altemier. It was 100 years ago that Henry Ford, Thomas Edison, naturalist and writer John Burroughs, Robert DeLoach of the Armour Company, and Harvey Firestone and his son caravanned through the mountains of West Virginia, Virginia, North Carolina and Tennessee. The group, known as "The Vagabonds", made a series of these camping trips between 1915 and 1924.

## The Bear Facts

Our July Open House featured John Hechler who presented an interesting presentation, "The Bear Facts", about the Pennsylvania Black Bear and their habit. John is a Registered Master Maine Guide specializing in boating and hunting, guiding bear and moose hunters. He retired as a Deputy Waterways Conservation Officer with the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, spending many summers patrolling Lake Wallenpaupack. In 2006 he was selected Pennsylvania Southeast Region's Deputy of the Year.
