
Haag's Mill Date Stone "Final Resting Place"

Greg Augustine and Kevin Hederson from the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation's Environmental Unit, Dunmore presented the Haag's Mill Bridge date stone to the historical society on May 6. The Society was a consulting party on the bridge replacement project and requested preservation of the 1873 bridge date stone and keystone and for the new bridge to simulate the original stone arch design. The new bridge was completed in 2008. The original bridge keystone was incorporated in the base of an interpretive sign near the bridge.

Located in South Sterling, Haag's Mill Bridge was built in 1873 adjacent to Haag's Mill and paid for by the residents of Wayne County. Through the years, structural repair work was completed on the bridge; however, more recent bridge inspections identified major deficiencies requiring its replacement. Haag's Mill Bridge was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1988.

Local History Programs for Students



The historical society sponsored Cheryl Stratham (left), Director of Education and Programs, Quiet Valley Living Historical Farm who presented a program on 19th Century agriculture and preservation for Third Grade students, Wallenpaupack South Elementary School. This is the tenth year that we have sponsored Cheryl who is retiring from her position at Quiet Valley. We have enjoyed working with Cheryl and appreciate her tasty treats, which she generously brings to the students and wish her all the best. This program was sponsored by Business Partner Keystone Propane.



Wallenpaupack South Elementary School Fourth Grade students journeyed to Peggy Bancroft Hall on a beautiful sunny spring day to learn about chores children their age would have performed 100 years ago. Historical society docents guided students through five stations: wool carding and spinning, ice harvesting, two-man saw, butter making, and neck yoke. Each student was also provided a copy of History of Newfoundland 1830-1880 written by Diane Smith. We thank Principal Kirsten, Fourth Grade Head Teacher Deborah Bigart, and our docents for their support. The Dime Bank sponsored the event.

Tour of Ledgedale

On May 4, we sponsored a tour of historic Ledgedale for 29 Society members and non-members. Ruth Altemier, Ellen Drake, Bernadine Lennon and Carla Smith led the tour which was sponsored by our Business Partner Edwards Sand and Stone.





The tour's first stop was Ledgedale Recreation Area where Bernadine Lennon presented the history of Lake Wallenpaupack and the Morss Tannery at Ledgedale which operated from 1849 to 1893, employing many Irish immigrants. Indian Rocks Property Owner's Association's Manager Harry Moore graciously permitted us to tour the Leonidas and Merilla Morss homestead (left) where the Morss's raised their eight children. Leonidas managed the Morss Tannery the entire time it operated. The third stop was Ledgedale Cemetery located in the Indian Rocks community. Ruth Altemier, Nancy Timm, Trudy Pickard, and Sam Conklin guided us through the genealogies of the families interred in the cemetery, many with German ancestry. Rob and Lisa Fry (below, front right of center) welcomed us to Cloud Hill Farm located at 136 Ledgedale Road. The white clapboard farmhouse is about 175 years old and has been owned by only two families - Simons and Fry. Thomas Simons built the house and his son, Henry, lived there until 1941 when it was sold to William and Mary Lynn Fry. The third generation of the Fry Family now owns, maintains and enjoys the property. At the tour's final stop, the Simons-Rumpf home, Ellen Drake presented the history of this beautiful two story stone house. It is one of the earliest homes built in Greene Township. Margaret Rumpf has owned the house since 1982 and faithfully maintains its historic integrity.



Recent Programs





From chestnuts to cemeteries, our program speakers had it all covered. John Wenderoth (left), past president of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey Chapter of the American Chestnut Foundation, presented an interesting program in April on the American Chestnut Tree covering the cause of the tree's demise and what is being done to restore it. The American chestnut tree is an iconic species, much like the American elm and the white oak. Its loss in our eastern forests in the past century is considered by many to be the greatest ecological disaster in recent history. The mission of The American Chestnut Foundation (www.acf.org) is to restore the American chestnut to a level of ecological and economic significance by the next century. Eye Associates of Paupack was the program's Business Partner Sponsor.

Dick Teeter (right), owner of Teeter's Funeral Home and Furniture Store, recalled that five generations of the Teeter family have operated the two businesses located on the corner of Church and Main Streets in Hawley. Teeter's Funeral Home was established in 1849 by Richard Adam Teeter who made his own coffins and had apprenticed as a furniture builder and upholsterer. One interesting request of Teeter's Funeral Home was to relocate the graves in the Purdytown Cemetery located along the Wallenpaupack River. Pennsylvania Power and Light Company petitioned the courts in 1924 to move the cemetery prior to construction of Lake Wallenpaupack. Part of the application included documentation of the present and proposed location of Purdytown Cemetery. Teeters Funeral Home was hired to move the remains from the cemetery to a location on higher ground at the back of the Purdy farm. Originally, it was thought there were about 20 graves in the cemetery; however, 54 graves were discovered. The cemetery is now owned and maintained by the Wallenpaupack Historical Society. The program was sponsored by Business Partner Peter Porter Realty.



Revisiting Lake Ariel Amusement Park



Combining his love of history and entertaining, life-long resident of Wayne County, Kurt Reed presented an informative history of Lake Ariel Amusement Park. In the mid to late 1800's, people traveled by Gravity Railroad to Jones Lake, as Lake Ariel was then known, to enjoy a picnic and swim. in the 1920s, amusement rides, a carousel, bumper cars, bingo, waterslides, wooden roller coasters, sandy beach and a picnic grove attracted up to 10,000 visitors daily with parking for 3,000 cars. Lake Ariel Park and beach continued through the 1930s. In World War II, the park closed temporarily. Damage to the park by Hurricane Diane in 1955 and the blizzard of 1958 wrecked the roller coaster and crushed the remaining rides. The park closed in 1958. The program was sponsored by Stone Silo Foods.

A Step Back in Time





Peg Reynolds Price and Pete Reynolds were our guests for Stories from the Past in May. Peg and Pete are siblings and the fifth generation to own and operate their great, great Aunt Ella Ehrhardt's general store in Newfoundland. They shared Ehrhardt genealogy, family anecdotes, family photographs and items from the store when Miss Ella operated it. Everything in the store today is original except the floors, which had to be replaced after the 1955 flood. The store's ceiling is most unusual with pieces of wood arranged to form geometric designs. The original wood pattern used to create the ceiling as well as the original glass display cases remain in the store. In the postcard above, the Ehrhardt home built in 1840 is seen to the left of the store and remains today in the loving care of Peg and Pete. The store has the Greek Revival influence with its front-gabled form and second-floor pediment doors and windows. Miss Ella would frequently be seen sitting on the store's second floor porch, watching the comings and goings in Newfoundland. We are so fortunate that Peg and Pete have kept the historic integrity of the general store and open its doors for all to enjoy.
